La Jicarita Awarded Nearly \$12 Million in Stimulus Funding

Recovery Act Dollars will bring Fiber - to - the - Home to Residents

La Jicarita Rural Telephone Cooperative has been providing telecommunications services to the citizens of Mora County, New Mexico, for over 40 years.

In 2010, La Jicarita applied for stimulus funds through the BIP program to upgrade existing copper facilities to fiber optics in the Mora area. The project focuses on providing fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) to customers that are located in very rural areas whose existing communication facilities prevent broadband service or limit the service speeds to unacceptable limits. Fiber-to-the-home service offerings will also give the highest speed capabilities for future applications. In addition, the project will replace the old and deteriorating copper telephone cable that is nearing or has reached the end of its useful life, as well as retiring aerial plant related to the Mora-San Miguel Electric Cooperative with its installation of a new electric line between La Cueva and Mora.

In April 2011, La Jicarita Rural Telephone Cooperative's Operations Manager, Michael J. Leyba, met with U.S. Senator Tom Udall to tour the new business office and discuss the Business and home owners are using technologies that require more and more bandwidth. Mr. Leyba spoke about the importance of broadband for rural business development and growth and also the ways that broadband brings education, public safety, telemedicine and other opportunities to rural customers. He also spoke of the number of jobs created or saved in this stimulus project and other services that contribute to the area's economic development.

Mr. Leyba said: "It is very important and we humbly ask you, Senator, that you and our other congressional delegates support any reform to the recent FCC Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) that would not undermine or eradicate approaches and mechanisms that have already achieved substantial success in promoting and maintaining broadband-capable networks in our rural carriers' service areas."

La Jicarita Receives VIVA Award

The Association of Commerce & Industry of New Mexico (ACI) has selected La Jicarita Telephone for a VIVA award. Each year, ACI recognizes outstanding companies that demonstrate Vision, Investment, Vitality and Action (VIVA). ACI recognizes businesses that demonstrate their unique vision or corporate philosophy, their investment in company employees and the surrounding community, their vitality through the organization's growth or financial strength, and their action to make New Mexico a better place to live.

A Benefit of Membership -La Jicarita Disburses over \$247,000 to Cooperative Members

In December 2010, La Jicarita disbursed \$247,499.15 in patronage capital credits to members. Because La Jicarita Telephone is a cooperative, owned by its members, we don't technically earn profits. Instead, if revenues exceed the cost of doing business the Co-op earns margins. Each year, margins earned are assigned to each member in proportion to the amount that member paid for telecommunication services. These assigned margins are called patronage capital credits.

What does La Jicarita do with patronage capital credits?

Available

Patronage capital credits are retained for a period of time to help fund capital projects like new services for subscribers, service to new areas and plant upgrades. This keeps costs down by allowing us to minimize our borrowing and decreases our debt load. This is exactly what patronage capital credits are

When are patronage capital credits refunded?

These funds are distributed when management and the La Jicarita board of directors believes it is a prudent thing to do based on La Jicarita's financial well being and need for capital to reinvest in infrastructure.

Who receives patronage capital credits?

All members who have service with La Jicarita during a year the Co-op earns margins are assigned patronage capital credits. The recent disbursement was paid to 1,590 members for the year 1996.
