# Fiber Project Update >>>

La Jicarita's fiber-to-the-home (FTTH) project continues to make significant progress as planned. The communities of Buena Vista, Golondrinas, La Cueva, Rio La Casa, and currently North Chacon are in the construction phase and some areas nearing completion. In most places fiber is being spliced and cut-over to fiber from the existing copper facilities.

The focus of the project has shifted from fiber optic cable placement to moving the cooperative members over to the new fiber optic services from the existing copper services in the areas where new fiber has been constructed.

Moving into 2024, La Jicarita plans to continue upgrading facilities in the Mora Exchange, to include Sierra Bonita and parts of the Wagon Mound Exchange. The Cooperative is proud to serve and provide its members with the best telecommunication services as possible.
